




Lynch, Dorothea. *Exploding into Life*. New York, NY: Aperture Foundation/Eugene Richards, 1986.

Eugene Richards documents Dorothea Lynch's fight and eventual death from breast cancer. The work is intensely personal, as Lynch is Richards lover/partner and the book is filled with her writings from her diary as she goes through the processes of chemotherapy and other treatments. We see Lynch in many highly vulnerable moments whilst she is losing her hair or even her breasts to mastectomy. The personal nature of the work must have made this a very painful, yet potentially cathartic book, for Richards to produce.


